Summer Message



This summer and fall we work our way through the Gospel of Luke and consider some of Luke's distinct stories, like the Parable of the Good Samaritan. Samaria plays an in important role as the backdrop to these stories. Jesus has set his face towards Jerusalem, and he and the disciples are taking the

most direct route, passing through the hostile land of Samaria. The stories this summer focus on the neighbour, the mission to non-Jewish would-be followers. They challenge us to ask, "who is my neighbour" and what would it look like to show mercy and compassion to my neighbour and invite them into the life of Christ.

We also have a chance to live into these stories this summer and fall. Peter Shephard helped craft an application for a York-Scarborough grant and we were awarded \$3,000 to continue various projects that help us connect with our neighbours. We've been invited to partner with the Church of the Transfiguration to host an outdoor Movie Night on August 23rd. Looking ahead, we'll host our annual community BBQ on September 8th, and host a Blessing of the Animals in conjunction with St Francis of Assisi on Sunday, October 6th. We also have funds to support continued PA Day camps and other initiatives that offer faith formation to children and families in our neighbourhood. I invite you to take part, lend a hand when you can, and most importantly, find the courage to invite someone new to come and see what God is up to in this community. Invite someone to join you Sunday morning or at one of our community events. Invite them into something bigger – the new life we find in Christ.

A Summary of General Synod

General Synod 2019 brought three important issues before the Church: Indigenous self-determination, the proposed revision of the marriage canon, and a primatial election as well as other concerns in the life of the Anglican Church of Canada.

In a speech that stirred emotional reactions, Archbishop Fred Hiltz, primate of the Anglican Church of Canada, apologized on behalf of the national church for spiritual harm done to Indigenous peoples.

Delivering his apology to the gathering of General Synod July 11, Hiltz laid out a confession of the ways the Anglican church demonized, dismissed and actively discouraged traditional Indigenous spiritual practices.

"For such shameful behaviours, I am very sorry. We were so full of our own self-importance. To quote the *Book of Common Prayer*, we followed 'too much the devices and desires of our own hearts.' We were ignorant. We were insensitive. We offended you. And I believe we offended God."

Also in regard to our indigenous peoples, in an historic vote, General Synod decided almost unanimously July 12 to approve changes to Canon XXII that enable a self-determining Indigenous church within the Anglican Church of Canada, and to bestow the title of Archbishop upon National Indigenous Anglican Bishop Mark MacDonald, a position which now ranks among the metropolitans.

As you have probably heard, the proposed revision of the marriage canon was narrowly defeated in the House of Bishops. It needed to pass with a two-thirds majority in all three Houses - lay, clergy, bishops. There was much pain upon the announcement of the vote. Subsequently, there was a statement from the House of Bishops. A document entitled "A Word to the Church" was passed by the Council of General Synod in March 2019. Linda Nicholls, the Bishop of the Diocese of Huron, was elected as the next primate, or head, of the Anglican Church of Canada. She will become the first woman to hold this position in the ACoC and only the second female primate in the Anglican Communion.

Speaking shortly after the election, Bishop Linda said: "you have bestowed on me an honour that I can hardly imagine, and it is terrifying. But it is also a gift, to be able to walk with the whole of the Anglican Church of Canada from coast to coast to coast."

Bishop Linda plays an active role in the leadership of the Anglican Communion. She is a member of ARCIC and is part of the Archbishop of Canterbury's Primates' Task Group on restoring relationships in the Anglican Communion.

We at St Augustine's have been privileged to know Linda as she filled in several times from 2006 to 2008 when John Hill was incumbent and Linda was employed by the National Church and so had Sundays available.

From Susan Smandych

As part of my ongoing studies for a Masters of Theological Studies (MTS) at Trinity College, earlier this summer I opted to take an elective course called "A Journey Through History: The Jesuit Missions in Early Modern Canada" located 'off campus' at the Canadian Martyrs' Shrine near Midland, just a few hours north of Toronto. As you may be aware, Canada's early modern history includes apostolic labours of Jesuit missionaries who ministered to both a vast number of First Nations peoples, and to a fledgling community of French settlers. Their efforts, chronicled in the Jesuit Relations, came to life in this intensive five-day course taught, in situ, at the heart of the former Wendat (Huron) Nation, where a group of nine students, facilitated by a Jesuit priest (who is also the Director of the Canadian Martyrs' Shrine), examined how Jesuit religious worldview shaped the missionaries' understanding of the 'New World', First Nations, and evangelisation during the earliest period in Canada's ecclesiastical history. The comprehensive, experiential learning included an archaeological visit; introduction to traditional Wendat Spirituality; visit to a pre-Christian Wendat village; visit to the Sainte-Marie among the Hurons re-constructed historical site; a guided tour and experience of the Canadian Martyrs' Shrine; and finally a (rainy) walking pilgrimage to the Martyrdom Site of St. Jean de Brébeuf and St. Gabriel Lalemant. It was a profound and humbling experience to be where the "blood of the martyrs sowed seeds of faith" and an incredibly rich learning opportunity. "Many Hands" Garden Party


