

# The City of Toronto considers the following items to be household hazardous waste and cannot be accepted at the Spring Clean Up Event



## Car, garage products

Antifreeze, car batteries, brake fluid, body filler, fuel (gasoline, diesel, kerosene), motor oil (new and used), oil filters, windshield washer fluid



## Personal care products

Alcohol-based lotions (aftershave, perfume, etc.), medication, nail polish remover  
*Syringes & medical sharps* – must be in a sealed container



## Household cleaning products

Abrasive powders, ammonia-based cleaners, bleach, disinfectants, drain cleaners, floor and furniture polish, metal cleaners, window glass and plastic cleaners



## Pesticides, garden products

Poisons (ant, mouse, rat, etc.), fertilizers, fungicides, insecticides, weed killers (herbicides)



## Paints, solvents, glue

Automotive spray paints, latex and water-based paints, paint strippers, rust removers, stains, thinners, turpentine, wood preservatives



## Other

Air fresheners, batteries, compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs), cooking oil, propane tanks, swimming pool chemicals

**NOTE:** Empty metal paint cans (with lids removed) and empty aerosol cans (with lids on), can go in recycling.

## The following are considered construction materials and cannot be accepted at the Spring Clean Up Event:

- **Concrete**
- **Drywall**
- **Soil**
